# What's happening at the Welcoming Place?

In 2017, Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) started an initiative at the Welcoming Place in Akron, PA, to remove invasive plants and add pollinator gardens and deep-rooted natives to the bioswale. In 2021, MCC began the transition to ecological landscaping for the entire campus with the goal of 70% native species. The Welcoming Place has pollinator gardens, two micro meadows and the large bioswale, which improves water management. In addition to being visually appealing, these biomes help to restore the ecosystems around them.



Native plants grow in the bioswale to reduce flooding.



Two native meadows on campus increase biodiversity and provide habitats for many species of insects.
