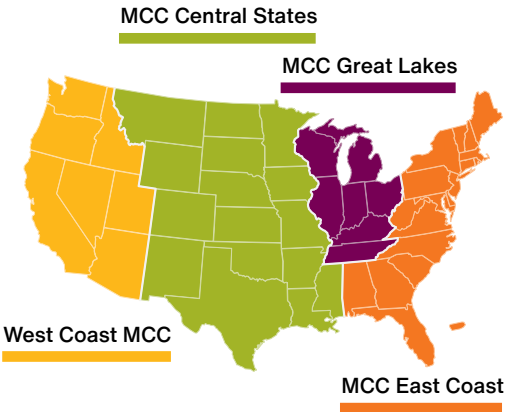

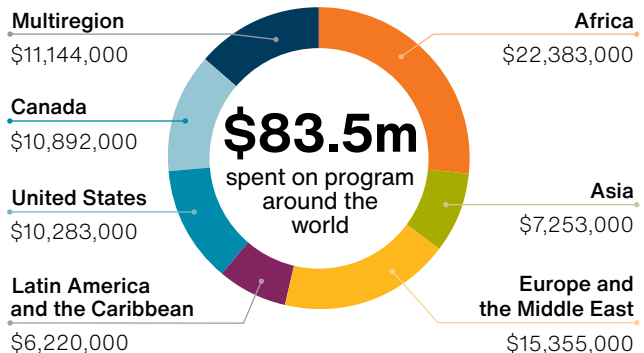

In Syria, MCC partner Christian Hope Center helps skilled workers facing economic hardship, along with the grave effects of war and the 2023 earthquakes, start or revitalize small businesses. Rina Rish and her family opened a medical lens shop in 2010, and kept it open during the war in Syria, despite dangers in the surrounding area. Through Christian Hope Center's microloans project, the family received new equipment, which will open up new sources of income.

Each day, after studying at his public, Bangla-language primary school, Hasda spends extra time at an MCC-supported, Mahale-language one.
