# Advancing peace through the Sustainable Development Goals

On Sunday, September 21, we celebrate the International Day of Peace. The theme for this year's celebration, "Actions for peace: Our ambition for the #Global Goals," reminds us of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, a commitment undertaken in 2015 by various governments toward attaining global wellbeing with the 17 Sustainable Development Goals as a benchmark. Progress toward achieving these goals by 2030 has been hampered by various factors, backtracking on global progress to attain a world free from violence and inequality.

One factor inhibiting progress is the unprecedented shift in spending priorities by governments of wealthy countries. Deep cuts to development, peacebuilding and humanitarian aid funding only make vulnerable communities more vulnerable. Our world today faces unprecedented humanitarian challenges, including violent conflicts, forced displacements, and looming famines. According to Global Humanitarian Overview, over 310 million people will require urgent lifesaving humanitarian assistance in 2025.

# Worship resources

Mennonite Central Committee supports communities and partners around the world as they work to nurture a culture of peace and address the root causes of violence. Sometimes this means transforming prejudice, division and suspicion into relationships built on trust and mutual coexistence. Other times, it means working to dismantle systems of oppression, corruption and inequality.

In the United States, MCC hosts Peace Camps for young adults, providing experiential learning rooted in theological reflection, peacebuilding practices, and real-world application. Peace Camps encourage participants to explore current issues with curiosity, and to exercise courageous vulnerability in their hospitality toward others. From circle processes to deep listening to songwriting, Peace Camps offer a variety of tools for young people to continue engaging in their communities to build peace.

Internationally, MCC supports peace education in schools, enhancing skills in nonviolent communication and conflict resolution among young people. In Nigeria, for example, there are approximately 8,000 active peace club members in 223 schools in Plateau and Adamawa states. The skills learned have led to an 87% reduction in bullying, corporal punishment and violent incidents, and to a greater sense of community. Also, students have accompanied family and community members in navigating conflicts and encouraging mutual coexistence.
